Inside The Numbers

Fighting like a man possessed with his whirlwind aggression, high work rate (89 punches per round to Inoue's 42.2), a but-for-the-ropes knockdown in round 10 and his vicious body attack (160 connects that broke the previous division record of 133 set by Tomoki Kameda vs. Immanuel Naidjala in 2013), the second-ranked Tsutsumi captured the WBA bantamweight title from Inoue, the younger brother of Naoya Inoue. Inoue was more accurate (29%-25% overall, 11%-9% jabs, 39%-30% power), but Tsutsumi's effective aggression and pressure resulted in final margins of 262-147 overall, 26-19 jabs, 236-128 power and 12-0 in the CompuBox round-by-round breakdown of total connects. Tsutsumi topped 100 attempted punches in seven rounds with his high-water mark being 120 in the final round while Inoue's best was 71 in the 11th, a far cry from his second-highest total of 48 in rounds five and 12. Kunhiro Iwasaki's 117-110 score for Tsutsumi appeared most reflective of the action inside the ring, though Michiaki Someya (115-112) and Koji Tanaka (114-113) also had the correct winner.
